
## BEAD Guides Chord Flow

Here's a one practical way approach using diminished chords. It also reveals an inside scoop on the connection between diminished chords and (dominant) 7 chords.

Here's a B diminished chord.




Here's a G7 bar chord. Do you see the similarities?







The B diminished chord is neatly hidden away in the G7 chord. Isn't that cool? It means pretty much anywhere you see a G7 chord, you could substitute in a B diminished chord. (You could also try one of those fancy sounding Bm7b5 chords, or a diminished 7 chord).

Comparing the notes on a scale ruler is another way to see the similarities and overlap between these chords.








This is true for the dominant seven chord and the diminished chord in any key.

Here are the most common ones for guitar:



E: B7 and D#m7b5 or D#dim7 A: E7 and G#m7b5 or G#dim7 D: A7 and C#m7b or C#dim7 G: D7 and F#m7b5 or F#dim7 C: G7 and Bm7b5 or Bdim7
