Because it's a blues, the song also borrow? The note named for the related major key center. The G note.


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
You end up with these three chords.



It uses a "stomp stomp clap rhythm," which is probably most famous from Queen's "We Will Rock You." (For what it's worth, "I Love Rock N' Roll" came first).



It leans heavily on this beat to create a feeling of drive and aggression, you know Rock, 'N Roll. Where blues note lands is also Rock 'N Roll: the "and" of 4, the final beat of each measure in the intro and chorus (before going into another stomp, stomp, clap).



Of course, there's more in this song than can fit on one page.
